'Overview of World War One' 10.15 - 11.00 Location: Main Hall Professor Mark Connelly, University of Kent

Mark is one of the UK's leading experts on WWI and is also a contributor to the BBC's World War One at Home project, academic adviser to the Institute of Education-led battlefields tours for schools projects, a member of the academic steering committee of the Imperial War Museum's Lives of the First World War and Operation War Diary projects. In addition, Mark also works with the Commonwealth War Graves Commission



'France in 1918' 12.00 - 12.30 Location: Main Hall Professor Alison Fell, University of Leeds This talk will focus on the politics & the home front as well as the fighting front.



An Oral History of Leicester in WW1 10.30 - 11.00

Location: Drama Studio Mr Colin Hyde , University of Leicester This talk covers the creation of the 'Leicestershire & Rutland Remember the First World War' web exhibition for the East Midlands Oral History Archive's website. It highlights the issues raised when using archival oral history material to create a web resource, and is illustrated with many sound clips about life on the home front in both the city and the county during and after the Great War.



'America in WW1' 13.30 - 14.00 Location: Main Hall Dr Sam Edwards, MMU This talk first examines why the United States didn't go to war in 1914, before addressing two other important questions: (1) What finally provoked American intervention in 1917?; and (2) What was the impact of the American Expeditionary Force on the conflict?

'Germany and World War One' 11.15 – 11.45 Location: Main Hall Dr Heather Jones, LSE What was the First World War like seen from Germany? Today I will discuss the German experience of the First World War, focusing upon four key themes – encirclement, occupation, blockade and revolution.



'Over the Top' Why the Allies Won in 1918. The Great Debate 14.15 - 15.00 Location: Main Hall Academic speakers Our visiting academic speakers will debate this topic and take questions from the audience.
